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


LETTER FROM THE EDITOR

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Behind the Music

The Art & Rise of Television Music Supervisors

eep running up that hill... Are you thinking about Stranger Things? If you're not, you're one of the few who hasn't made a lasting connection between the expertly placed Kate Bush song and the thrilling fourth season of the Netflix series. While it's historically not been at the center of the entertainment conversation, the music soundtrack to our favorite TV shows, movies, and games is often the reason that those content creations have a lasting impression. When it comes to our taste in music, many of us owe a debt to what has become known as "music supervisors," the mostly unknown figures responsible for selecting and securing tracks to support a story's narrative.

Rewind: The History of Music Supervision

Hollywood started using the official title "music supervisor" in the 1950s, when Universal Pictures producer Joseph Gershenson took that credit on *Abbott and Costello Meet the Invisible Man*. Music either created or curated for the big screen, movie soundtracks, have become even more timeless than the films themselves. We can't imagine 2001: A Space Odyssey without

Strauss' "Also Sprach Zarathustra," *The Bodyguard* without "I Will Always Love You," *Top Gun* without "Danger Zone," or Johnny getting Baby out of the corner at the end of *Dirty Dancing* without "(I've Had) The Time of My Life."

Just like on the big screen, music on television has become essential. Jingles and original theme songs became synonymous with television shows like *The Jeffersons*, *The Golden Girls*, and *Cheers* in the 1970s and 80s. By the 1990s and early 2000s, television shows began to be known for their soundtracks. HBO's *The Sopranos* leveraged music by Journey, Jefferson Airplane, and of course, Bruce Springsteen to build the world of Tony Soprano. Network shows, likewise, became launching pads for emerging bands and artists thanks to music supervisors like **John McCullough** (*Party of Five, Dawson's Creek, Charmed*), **Jennifer Pyken** (*Felicity, Alias, Smallville, One Tree Hill*), and **Alexandra Patsavas** (*The O.C., Chuck, Grey's Anatomy, Gossip Girl*). Unlike securing music for a feature film which typically has around 15-20 tracks, music supervisors for television need to secure music for each episode quickly and with much smaller budgets.

Music supervision is still an emerging field in the music industry and one of the most misunderstood. Perhaps the largest misconception is that a music supervisor simply creates playlists. The Guild of Music Supervisors, an organization dedicated to promoting awareness and understanding of the position within the film industry, was only just founded in 2010.

By definition, a music supervisor oversees all aspects of music in a project. In fact, the music supervisor role is essentially the head of the music department for a production, meaning that one must not only have a wide knowledge of music and music history, but also hold a deep understanding of licensing and creative rights. Music supervisors are challenged to not only put together a cohesive soundtrack that everyone is happy about, but also within the production budget. Hiring a knowledgeable music supervisor also generally saves money as they know how to handle licensing personalities and have forged deep relationships with managers, record labels, and publishers.

As media becomes more immersive and multi-sensory, music supervisors now have a leading role when it comes to building community, working from behind the scenes to create a lasting emotional connection. These creative professionals are responsible for curating our auditory associations with beloved characters and worlds, stimulating our senses and inspiring our playlists, yet they rarely get the recognition they deserve as curators of culture.

Until now.

Today's Top Television Music Supervisors

Earlier this month, Emmy nominations were announced and major music supervisors from last year's television whirlwind are getting some well-deserved recognition. Coming as a surprise to no one, **Nora Felder**, the all-star responsible for Kate Bush's latest resurgence, has been nominated for *Stranger Things*. This is her fourth nomination for the show, meaning each season, her stellar work has garnered recognition. Season four has seen some other notable music choices, namely the use of "Master of Puppets." Following the July 1st release of the last two episodes of the season, the 1986 song spiked on streaming services, with daily on-demand U.S. audio streams growing nearly 400% in the first few days of the month compared to its June streaming totals, according to Luminate.

Felder, whose previous work includes What We Do In The Shadows, Californication, and Better Things, believes surges like this represent the staying power of music, proving that talented songwriters can transcend generations and musical trends. While she anticipated that throwbacks used in the show would trend again, the overwhelming response is a shock. When asked about it, Felder has said, "This is truly an exciting moment in music history proving what I've always believed, that timeless music and songs can and should live on forever."

An incredibly successful music supervisory duo, Jen Malone and Adam Leber, have been nominated again this year for Euphoria, demonstrating the power of collaboration on multiple levels. Malone has seen a meteoric rise as of late, with Showtime's Yellowjackets, Paramount+'s The Offer, and Atlanta, which is not to say that she's new to the scene, but rather to emphasize how in tune she is with the needs and interests of today's consumers. With her help, *Euphoria* has become a social-media phenomenon, trending on a weekly basis with viewers eagerly identifying new songs and adding them to their playlists. The show itself provides virtually no genre or decade restrictions, providing the supervisors with a freedom that one might find daunting if they weren't so professional. Hand in hand with American talent manager, entrepreneur, and investor Adam Leber, Malone has shaped the cultural zeitgeist. The pair were previously nominated for an Emmy for season 1, and have continued the standard of work, earning them this second opportunity.

Superstar Music Supervisor **Robin Urdang** has already won three Emmys for her work on *The Marvelous Mrs. Maisel* and she's back with her fourth nomination for the show. With music so central to the plot and establishing the era, she has been an integral part of its evolution, seeing it through from purely score and source to heavily featured on-camera music. With over 30 years of credits including *Burn Notice, Younger, Nomadland, Gilmore Girls: A Year in the Life,* and *Call Me by Your Name,* she is undeniably a pro, but she still maintains a grounded influence and ear to the ground attitude developed from her years working in bars. Her nuanced attitude is evident in her work. "I always feel like it should allow people to feel what they want to feel, and not push them or make them feel something." She goes on to say, "When music is used right, sometimes you don't even notice it and sometimes you love it. It makes you feel. It's another character."

Thomas Golubić has put the soundtrack of *Better Call Saul* on the map, earning him yet another Emmy nomination. The soundtrack features an eclectic mix spanning decades with tracks by Nancy Sinatra, Burl Ives, Dave Porter, Rick Springfield, Pixies, The Breeders, BADBADNOTGOOD (Storm #22), and more. Golubić, DJ and twice Grammy-nominated record producer has previously worked on *Breaking Bad, The Walking Dead, Grace and Frankie*, and *Six Feet Under* among many other film and television projects. In 2017 Thomas became the president of the Guild of Music Supervisors, meaning he is not only a working stable, he is an integral part of the music supervisor community.

Ozark also turned heads, or rather ears this year, with **Gabe Hilfer** leading the charge. With previous work including *Suicide Squad*, *Black-ish*, and *Sausage Party*, he is capable of impressive range. Music was indispensable in setting the tone for *Ozark*, bringing complexity and layers to a dark world. Hilfer considered the music an exclamation point, ensuring that each choice was deliberate and intentional. While the sheer number of songs used might not be the most impressive, the lasting impression from them certainly is.


Rounding out the nominations, **Janet Lopez** is being recognized for her balanced and intriguing work on *The White Lotus*. Toeing the line between light-hearted enjoyment and moments of sheer suspense, Lopez's music choices created a world that people could not stop talking about. Bringing her experience from shows like *The Twilight Zone*, *The Nevers*, and *Utopia*, Lopez brought audiences to a far-off place, while managing to stay very tethered to our reality.

Of course, the exciting players in the space are certainly not limited to this year's Emmy nominees. The world of music supervisors is rich and constantly changing. People like **Samuel Diaz** (NCIS, Blue Bloods, Star Trek: Picard), **Matt Biffia** (Sex Education, Hacks), and the incredible duo of **Christa Miller** and **Tony Von Pervieux**, who curate music for Ted Lasso, have also done their part to remind audiences of old songs and introduce them to new ones.

Credit Where Credit is Due

In June, NPR reported that music supervisors are looking to unionize with the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees, or IATSE. Like many workers across many industries, music supervisors started talking seriously about unionizing at the onset of the pandemic. According to IATSE, 75% of an estimated 500 music supervisors have now signed authorization cards to join the union. This is largely because most music supervisors are considered independent contractors and ineligible for unemployment payments. The union says music supervisors want to standardize pay rates in order to tackle discrimination and disparities; gain access to healthcare and retirement plans; and negotiate with the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers, which has not voluntarily recognized the union.

It is clear that music supervisors are striving for credit where credit is due in an industry where behind the scenes creators are finally starting to be recognized. While not often glamorized or publicly recognized for their work, music supervisors have become a make-it-or-break-it force when it comes to what we experience on the small screen—bringing the cinematic experience home. With the ability to bring new life to an old song, help indie artists find new audiences, and create a moment that will last forever in the hearts and minds of fans, these multi-talented maestros are growing in prominence and are a force on the pop culture landscape.
